## **Highland Creek History:**



**Dateline: JULY 1960** 

Another long-time structure in Highland Creek bowed to progress this week when the house owned by the J.H. Moon family was uprooted from its location at the corner of Kingston Road and Highway 2A and moved to Old Kingston Road in West Hill.

The two-storey structure had been built 35 years earlier (1925) by carpenter and owner, James Henry Moon. It is now to be retained by John's son, Forbes Moon, who operates Moon's Taxi from his location on the north side of Kingston Road, east of Morningside Ave. (Forbes and his wife Betty Moon went on to have 6 children. Some may recall one of the sons, Jim Moon, from West Hill Public school and West Hill Collegiate Institute, as a top-notch wrestler.) The Moon family home will be placed on a new foundation on the north side of Old Kingston Road and Manse Road, west of The Melville Church. The house remains there to the present day under different ownership.

The move was almost a full day's project, with various hydro lines being moved and trees trimmed where required. The structure was raised from its original location and trucked from Kingston Road, west over the Highland Creek Bridge to the intersection of Kingston Road and Old Kingston road, then proceeded east to Manse Road where it was placed on its current foundation on the north side of Old Kingston Road. Interestingly enough, the water pipes and heating vents were disconnected at the main floor level and moved intact with the house.

The Highland Creek site of the house was purchased by the Department of Highways, presumably for road-widening purposes. The house was then sold at public auction and purchased by Mrs. Moon on the understanding that the structure would be moved within a certain time frame. As reported in The Enterprise Newspaper of the day, the cost to purchase and move the building was approximately \$7,000.00.

As readers can observe from the photographs, the move across the high-level bridge must have been a treat for the locals to witness as you do not often see a two-storey brick house being transported over a 100-foot high steel bridge.

The following are abbreviated excerpts from the Highland Creek Community Associations report submitted on February 22, 2022, to the Minister of the Environment for him to review our opposition to the DSBRT along Ellesmere Road. Excerpts are also included from the Arborist Report.

Highland Creek is strictly a residential area. Homes are purchased for the suburban feel, its safe and clean environment and the mature tree-lined streets. The trees are home to a large variety of birds and in the conservation area on Ellesmere Road there are several species of wildlife.

Reviewing the submission by Metrolinx, the HCCA finds its two most important issues are climate change and the removal of trees, many on private property, and air quality which can be compromised by Durham Region diesel polluting buses.


Climate Change and the impact of Tree Removal Summary. The Arborist Report Summary of Tree Impact within the Study by Municipalities.

- Durham/Scarborough Bus Rapid Transit is a 36 km route Number of Trees to be removed are 3,278, plus 618 impacted or injured by construction.
- In total, 3,896 are affected, or 108 trees for every km.
- In Highland Creek, on a 2.8 km route along Ellesmere Road, 271 trees will be removed and 49 injured.
- Total Number of Trees impacted in Highland Creek = 320, or 106 trees per km

The loss of these trees will have a huge impact on the health and wellbeing of all residents along the DSBRT route. In 2012, the City of Toronto council adopted a goal of housing 40% tree canopy. Toronto's urban forest provides \$55 million in environmental benefits every year including improved air quality through pollution removal.

Through shade and transpiration, increasing urban tree cover can mitigate exposure to extreme heat events.

A higher density of trees in a neighbour-hood has been shown to significantly improve physical and mental health, such as reducing blood pressure and stress levels and promoting physical activity. Trees also make urban environments aesthetically more pleasing. which raises property values.



## IMPACT OF AIR QUALITY ON RESIDENTS OF HIGHLAND CREEK.

- The DSBRT bus fleet would be dieselfueled up until 2041.
- Durham Region Transit has recently purchased a new diesel-powered 90passenger swing bus fleet with an expected service life of 20 plus years.
- Emissions from idling buses were not taken into consideration when picking up passengers at stops or traffic lights (Assumption: buses will not idle).

The following are residents who will be directly affected by CO2 emissions and unburned carbon gases (black smoke) from diesel buses:

- 220 homes with driveways fronting Ellesmere Road
- 137 homes on the south side and 135 homes on the north side of Ellesmere would also be affected with left turns prohibited.
- First-year UTSC students living in the new multi-storey student residence building.
- Staff and students at the UTSC Campus Administration Building.
- Customers of two plazas with entrances directly facing Ellesmere Road.
- Highland Creek Library Branch staff and patrons.
- Highland Creek Community Park visitors
- Architect's Building on 6534 Kingston Road, with an entrance facing Ellesmere Road.

## HIGHLAND CREEK NEEDS EVERY TREE TO FIGHT THE DSBRT BUS POLLUTION

During a meeting with Metrolinx and the HCCA – DSBRT Committee on February 16, 2022 at MPP Thanigasalam's office, the following items were discussed.

- Metrolinx stated that they will not look into any alternatives. The plan is still to have diesel buses along Ellesmere Road up to two minutes east and west.
- Metrolinx was asked how the DSBRT is going to help climate change with the plan to cut down 1,250 trees in Toronto and the use of diesel buses until 2041? Between Oshawa Centre and Scarborough Town Centre there are 49 stops and numerous traffic lights. The idling at all these stops will add significantly to air pollution – this is not mentioned in the Environmental Report.
- Metrolinx said they were not aware of this omission in the Environmental Report.

Our club was started in 1947 to support working women. Membership in one club entitles you to membership in Provincial, Federal, and International. BPW International was one of the first NGO's to get a seat at the United Nations. Then in the late 70's we received Category One status which allowed us to put on Agenda items regarding women and children.

We meet once a month for a dinner meeting and have interesting speakers come in. We do fundraising to support two women's charities and write Resolutions to government to change laws that affect women and children.

#### **Advocacy**

Each year, BPW Ontario and Canada members work on Resolutions that are presented at the provincial conference and the national convention, discussed, debated, and accepted. These Resolutions become part of a brief presented to the Prime Minsters office for consideration.

Last year North Toronto wrote a Resolution on the Age of Child Marriage. The United Nations defines child marriage "as the formal or informal union of any person under the age of 18." The practice is widely considered a violation of human rights with negative consequences for health and personal development.

Girls that marry later are empowered and can work toward a better future for themselves when they: learn about and exercise their human rights, are able to take care of their health, are protected from violence and go to school.

Did you know the age of marriage in Canada is only 16? And that was averaged out as some Provinces were even younger!

### **Fundraising**

North Toronto Business Professional Women support the Thunder Woman Healing Lodge Society being built on Kingston Road near Kennedy.

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### **Reporting and Preventing Fraud**

#### Crime Prevention Office Toronto Public Service

Fraud is a crime that we, as a community, commonly refer to as a "scam". Fraud occurrences typically target the victim's money or identity. Being a victim of a fraud can have a significant impact on someone's life. People have lost their life savings, their home or other large investments, and endured the subsequent negative impact on their credit score. Toronto Police Service is dedicated to assisting members of the community to provide the awareness and tools to prevent fraud and scams.

At the beginning of 2023, the Toronto Police Service launched a yearlong campaign called #DontGetScammed, educating the public about the most "popular" frauds. A video is released on the first Friday of every month describing a trending scam and explains what to be aware of to prevent others from becoming a victim. You can find the videos on the Toronto Police Service and 43 Division social media platforms such as Facebook, Instagram and Twitter (see handles at the bottom).

Toronto Police has also updated their crime prevention website focusing on fraud reporting and education. The website includes detailed information on what to do if you think you might be a victim of a crime, how to report and what details may be required. Information on the site includes tips on how to protect yourself from scams on a number of topics including, but not limited to, businesses, charities, dating, cryptocurrency, taxi and investment scams.

If you are a victim of fraud or suspect your

information has been compromised, please review the following steps to reduce the chances of it happening again.

- Stop all communication with the scammer (that is, the person who initiated the scam)
- Stop making any major financial decisions until your accounts are secured
- Gather all records and correspondence you have of the scam
- Notify your financial institution and other companies where you have an account that may have been affected
- Change all your account passwords, including social media sites
- Protect the devices used to communicate with the scammer, such as your computer, laptop, tablet and cellphone with anti-virus software
- Ensure security or operating software on your device is up-to-date
- Install anti-spyware protection on your computer
- Perform a virus scan of your hard drive and files
- Do not send your personal, credit card or online banking details in an email
- Put an alert on your credit report by contacting Equifax Canada or TransUnion Canada

Educating yourself on frauds can help protect you and your loved ones from suffering a loss. Please remember that scammers are always looking for fresh opportunities to commit the next fraud.

Tps.ca/fraud provides valuable information on the most frequently-occurring scams.

year included the vaccination scam where community members were receiving a text message or email saying that they are eligible for their vaccine. The message would include a fraudulent link where the person would fill out all of their personal information, providing this to the scammers. Another scam occurred after Rogers customers lost all of their services/Internet for almost a full day. The next day, scammers were already sending text messages for customers to click on, to receive their cash rebate for not having services. Again, this link would have the person fill out their personal information or banking information, putting them at risk of fraud. It is important to be aware that whenever an item or service is hard to obtain (ie: vaccinations in early 2021), scammers will use this to their advantage to deceive others who are trying to obtain some-

### **Recipe: Flambe Filet Mignon**

Mason Sherk, Master Butcher HQ Meats



#### **Ingredients:**

- 4 6-ounce filet mignon
- 1/4 cup butter
- Dijon mustard
- Salt
- Freshly ground black pepper
- 1 white onion chopped
- 1 cup cognac
- 1/2 cup heavy cream
- 1/2 cup red wine
- 2 ounces peppercorns
- Fresh rosemary

#### Instructions:

Rub filets in salt, black pepper, and Dijon mustard. In a large skillet, heat ½ cup of butter. Add chopped onion and cook until wilted. Add filets and brown each side for roughly 2 minutes or until internal temperature reaches 90°F (32°C). Pour warm cognac over filets and flame. When flame dies out, add cream and wine and cook to reduce and thicken sauce. Remove filets when they reach 120°F and set aside. Add peppercorns and rosemary and simmer for 3 minutes while stirring. Plate filets and pour sauce over filets for an incredible, home-cooked steakhouse experience.





Dear Highland Creek,

Any attack, or attempted attack, on our democracy is unacceptable. Our political system is one that relies on confidence, as all Canadians deserve a fair electoral process that respects the sanctity of their vote. This most basic promise must especially be kept when facing hostile authoritarian forces.

We had this in mind when we created the Critical Election Incident Public Protocol, which brought together senior public servants and our national security agencies to assess foreign election interference and publicly share any incidents that threaten the integrity of a federal election. The panel reported that while for-

eign interference attempts absolutely existed, the 2019 and 2021 elections unfolded with integrity.

Lately, there have been questions about our democracy as Canadians hear and read about the issue of attempted foreign interference by China. Like you, I believe Canadians deserve answers and reassurance. To chart the course forward, our government has appointed the Right Honourable David Johnston as an Independent Special Rapporteur to investigate foreign interference in the last two federal elections and make recommendations on how to further protect our democracy and uphold confidence This issue strikes at the core of who we are in it.

## **Trustee Sriskandarajah TDSB Updates**

Our 2023-24 Budget Process is currently underway. Every year, this process begins with staff allocation, which is guided by several factors, including student enrolment, collective agreements, class size caps and averages, as well as the TDSB's commitment to equity, student achievement and well-being. This year, several additional factors, including the elimination of Ministry funding provided during the COVID-19 pandemic, have impacted our budget and staff allocation. The Board continues to advocate to the Ministry of Education to provide adequate and sustainable funding to support student achievement and well-being.

2023-2024 is going to be a challenging budget year. There are structural deficits. The Board is budgeting to spend more money than it receives from the province, including costs to support student safety. The pandemic had a negative impact on the budget, examples being decreased enrolment (we receive our funding based on student enrollment), decreases in permit, international student tuitions, and continuing education revenues, and \$70 million in costs that were not funded by the Ministry of Education.

This year, a key update is the inclusion of climate action commitments, reflecting the TDSB's commitment to address the issue of climate change in our schools.

These additions were made following important feedback received in the survey and from the Environmental Sustainability Community Advisory Committee.

#### **Multi-Year Strategic Plan Renewal**

We are beginning to renew our Multi-Year Strategic Plan and we invite the entire TDSB community to get involved and share your voice. The renewal process will build on the foundation of our current strategic plan and there will be a variety of opportunities to share your thoughts and ideas in the coming months. Please visit



### **Celebrating Earth Month**

This April, we celebrate one of my favourite national months: Earth Month. In the spirit of Earth Month, I'd like to share with you some of the wonderful initiatives the City of Toronto is taking to address the climate change crisis and keep our environment clean, sustainable and safe:

### **Climate Action Plan**

The City of Toronto has adopted an ambitious strategy to reduce community-wide greenhouse gas emissions in Toronto to Net Zero by 2040. The City of Toronto is one of only three big cities in North America with this 2040 target. In 2022, the City's TransformTO Net Zero Strategy won the Environment, Climate and Energy Award at the 9<sup>th</sup> annual American Planning Association Awards for Excellence in Sustainability. Our TransformTO Net Zero Strategy is driving

new and faster action to bring down emissions in the short term, and is helping get us to where we need to be by 2040. Toronto has been and continues to be a trailblazer in climate action. Toronto's emissions have decreased by 38 percent since 1990, meaning we are well on our way to achieving our next target of 45 percent by 2025.

#### BetterHomesTO

Homes and buildings generate over half of the greenhouse gas emissions in Toronto, and that is why the City is helping homeowners and buildings decarbonize by 2040. The City also developed and implemented the Toronto Green Standard to outline sustainable design and performance requirements for new private and city-owned developments, and has committed to lead by example and implement programs to support net zero emissions targets in Cityowned buildings. The BetterHomesTO initiative has provided homeowners with information, tools and resources to help them learn about and take on home energy retrofits. #### Women4ClimateTO Mentorship Program

In March, Toronto announced the 3<sup>rd</sup> annual cohort of the Women4ClimateTO program. The Women4ClimateTO mentorship program provides female climate leaders with mentorship, training and networking opportunities to help advance their climaterelated projects, businesses or products to the next level. Toronto is one of three Canadian cities, and 21 cities globally, participating in C40 Cities' Women4Climate Men-

torship Programme, which has reached every continent and supported more than 400 women to accelerate climate projects in their communities. Following the program, the mentees will present their projects at a pitch competition which will see the top three initiatives receive a cash award and additional support to advance their work. It is inspiring to see so many young women looking to make an impact on their community and the world at large. I sincerely look forward to seeing the pitches presented in the coming months.

## One-Year Anniversary of the War in Ukraine

In late February, the City of Toronto commemorated the one year anniversary of Russia's unjust invasion of Ukraine. Following a march, I joined Prime Minister Trudeau and Premier Ford on stage to share words of solidarity for the people of Ukraine. It was a powerful and moving day that I was humbled to be a part of. Since the beginning of the invasion, roughly 143,000 Ukrainians have arrived in Canada with 52% of those arrivals landing in Toronto. As a city, we are providing support to resettle Ukrainian refugees—from housing to services at locations across the GTA. We continue to stand in support of Ukraine and denounce Russia for their unconscionable actions. The City of Toronto has been flying the Ukrainian flag every day since the beginning of the war. Furthermore, the City also installed "Free Ukraine" signs around the Russian Consulate in another sign of support for the Ukrainian people.




