

If you have been in the Village lately, you may have noticed a faint trace of wood smoke and barbequing meat in the air. I followed my nose to discover a new eatery in the Village.

Welcome to Northern Smokes. As they describe themselves "We have a passion for smoking meat and finding the perfect blend of wood chips and spices to ... bring you the experience of a Southern style BBQ with a Northern touch."

They are owned by siblings Imran and Rahima Ali. Imran started barbequing in his backyard and soon friends and neighbours were clamouring for more of his delicious BBQ. I'm happy they did, because they decided to look into starting Northern Smokes. Good fortune (for us) led them to locate in the space that Lou's Souvlaki used to occupy at the south end of the plaza between Kingston Road and Morrish Road, near the Remax storefront

They specialize in brisket, tri tip, beef back ribs, jerk chicken, and (occasionally) lamb.

I tried the brisket and it is as good as I have close I am not complaining. I should note that had anywhere (I have had BBQ in both Carolina's, Tennessee and Oklahoma as well as a number of the local BBQ joints). My son had the jerk chicken, which he agreed was very good with a solid spice bite to it. they have "burnt ends" as a special order – let them know 4 days in advance if you wish to try this amazing BBQ taste treat.



In addition, I had an opportunity to speak with Constable Julie Campbell who assured me if there were any issues involving police Highland Creek Community matters brought to my attention, I could contact her direct. aware of this along with

An overhead presentation was given outlining the major crime areas in Scarborough and I was pleased to learn that Highland Creek was one of the lowest. Break and entry is down for 2019 although commercial businesses are a prime area source and it was suggested that signs be put up indicating no cash funds on the premises at the end of the day. As far as residents are concerned, it was suggested that one should be aware of their surroundings

phones and that no expensive jewelry be worn. Seniors are prone to fraud and should be mindful of door to door salespersons along with telephone calls asking for personal information.

### Cute Alert: We Have Babies!

Spring can be such an exciting time at the Zoo – especially when we have important births to celebrate. Over the past few months the Toronto Zoo has welcomed significant births to our Zoo family – including A Grevy's zebra foal, two red river hoglets and an endangered African penguin chick!

### **Grevy's Zebra Foal**

Tori, an eight-year-old female Grevy's zebra (Equus grevyi), gave birth to a male foal in the early morning hours on Wednesday, February 13, 2019. The zebra foal was named "Obi", in keeping with the Star Wars-themed names for zebra foals born at the Zoo, including Luke, Leia and Rey. This birth is important for Grevy's zebra conservation as the species is currently listed as Endangered on the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN) Red List of Threatened Species. Grevy's zebras were first put on the IUCN list in 1986 after their population began to decline due to overhunting in the late 1970s Today, Grevy's zebras are primarily found in Kenya and Ethiopia and over the past 30 years their global population, currently only at 2,800, has declined by approximately 70%. Loss of grazing habitat and reduced access to available water sources, competition for resources, hunting, and disease are the major threats facing Grevy's zebras in the wild.

Zoo guests will be able to see Obi on exhibit in the African Savanna this spring. Stay tuned for details on his debut!

### **Red River Hoglets**

Tisa, an eight-year-old female red river hog (Potamochoerus porcus), gave birth to a litter of two female hoglets, Hazel and Ginger, on Sunday, February 17, 2019. This is the first litter for Tisa and Sir Philip Pigglesworth III, father and eight-year-old male, and the third litter of red river hogs born in Toronto Zoo's history. The Zoo's Wildlife Care Team say that Tisa continues to be a great first-time mom, very trusting and comfortable with Keepers. Dad, Sir Philip Pigglesworth III, is a very involved dad and the hoglets enjoy spending time snuggling with him on exhibit. The curious hoglets are nursing well and continue to eagerly explore their habitat in the African Rainforest Pavilion.

Zoo guests can visit Hazel, Ginger and the whole red river hog family on exhibit daily in the African Rainforest Pavilion.

### **Endangered African Penguin Chick**

An endangered African penguin chick (Spheniscus demersus) successfully hatched on Friday, March 1, 2019! The egg was laid by penguin pair, Ellie and Chupa, who were recommended to breed by the Species Survival Plan (SSP). This is the third chick for this pair, who are fairly inexperienced parents, having only raised one chick themselves. While raising their first chick, Ellie and

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Chupa encountered a few parenting difficulties; so this time around Wildlife Care made the decision to call upon veteran penguin parents, Flap and Shaker, to help out. After allowing Ellie and Chupa to incubate for the first couple weeks, the egg was pulled and given to penguin pair, Flap and Shaker, who finished incubation and continued raising the chick after it hatched.

Penguin chicks grow very fast, and

therefore become independent of their parents at a fairly young age. At day 21, Wildlife Care Keepers traditionally remove the chick from the parents to begin the hand-rearing process. By this point, the chick is quite large and mobile enough for the Keepers to care for



them. African penguins do not show sexual dimorphism, so until bloodwork is performed by our Wildlife Health Team, we won't know

The arrival of this endangered African penguin chick signifies a great achievement for these penguin parents and the African Savanna Wildlife Care staff. Of the 18 penguin species around the world, the African penguin is one of the most endangered. Over the past century the population size of wild African penguins has dropped by more than 97%. Factors still affecting their decline include lack of food (due to climate change and over-fishing), disease, predation, and pollution (mainly oil spills). Recent estimates suggest, there could be as few as than 25,000 breeding pairs left in the wild.

# The Founding of Highland Creek

Although the Thomson family can Company arguably be considered the first family to which settle in the old Township, and the first post an office was opened at Scarborough Village, business in the first true "community" to be established was at Highland Creek. Prior to any settle-timber and ment, Elizabeth Simcoe, in describing the-Township of Glasgow (as Scarborough was first called), referredto "the high lands of Toronto". The river flowing through the area became known as the highland creek. William Knowles, emigrating from New Jersey in 1802, was forced to stop near what is now Grimsby where his wife gave birth to their eighth child. Knowles moved on ahead and in October, 1802 bought a 200 acre lot from Joseph Ketchum who had settled in the area of Highland Creek a few years earlier. Family stories handed down through generations indicate Knowles was expecting a house with the land but found only a roofless log shanty. His first days in Scarborough may well have been spent under the tall pines.

Knowles was a blacksmith and built the churches from all major denominations Township's first smithy, making the nails for the first frame barn in Scarborough and planting one of the first orchards. 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
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### Price on carbon helps to fight climate change

My daughter Bairavi and I had a terrific time connecting with local residents and members of the Highland Creek Community Association, and I look forward to the continued beautification of the Highland Creek Village in the weeks, months and years to come!

### Connecting with Scarborough -Rouge Park

Over the past month, my team and I have had a number of opportunities to connect with the residents of Scarborough – Rouge Park. I was honoured to celebrate the 47th Anniversary of the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms with the Grade 5 students in Mrs. Cooper and Mr. Douglas' class at Morrish Public School, thrilled to connect hundreds of youth age 16 - 30 with local employers at the Malvern Methodist Church for our Youth Job Fair, delighted to enjoy a brisk Spring Walk in the Rouge National Urban Park, proud to welcome 45 of Canada's newest citizens to our community during our Scarborough -Rouge Park Citizenship Reception, and happy listen to the questions and comments of our community during our successful Sip n' Chat Open House event at our constituency office.

### **Price on Pollution and Climate Action Incentive**

As of April 1st 2019, it is no longer free to pollute in Canada. Our government introduced a national price on carbon pollution in order to protect the health of our environment and to ensure that big polluters begin paying their fare share. Instituting a price on pollution will not only help Canada meet our international commitments as outlined by the the 2015 Paris Climate Agreement, but will help keep our environment safe for future generations.

A recent study published by Environment Canada indicates that Canada is, on average, warming at twice the rate of the rest of the world. Even more troubling is the fact that Northern Canada is currently warming at a rate of almost three times the global average. Global warming has had devastating consequences across the country, including the enhancement of forest fires in Western Canada, severe flooding in Central and Atlantic Canada and the depletion of the Canadian Arctic in Northern Canada.

How does the price on pollution work? It's simple; the more someone pollutes, the more they are required to pay. Here in Ontario, all money collected from the price on pollution will, by law, be returned back to Ontarians. 90% of that revenue will be returned through a tax rebate called the Climate Action Incentive.





The remaining 10% of revenues collected will go towards schools, hospitals and businesses in Ontario in order to help them become more energy efficient.

The Climate Action Incentive will leave 8 out of 10 Ontario families better off, with the average family of four receiving a Climate Action Incentive payment of \$307 upon successfully filing their taxes. Putting a price on carbon pollution is part of our government's ambitious plan to fight climate change, protect our environment and grow our economy.





### To Detox or Not to Detox?



As a Naturopathic Doctor I have patients ask me about doing a detox on a regular basis. If you have ever been interested in a detox but not really sure what it is or how to do it please keep reading.

#### What is detox?

In simple terms detox (or detoxification) is the way our body gets rid of toxins. Detoxification is not something you are consciously doing; your body detoxes continuously, 24 hours a day. This is necessary as we are constantly exposed through the environment (eg. environmental toxins such as car exhaust, pesticides/food preservatives and additives, chemicals in body care products etc.). Our body generally does a great job but over time the main detoxification pathways can get backed up or overburdened. When this happens your body still wants to get rid of toxins but the less preferred pathways get used and/or toxins get stored in the body and this results in symptoms. There are many symptoms that may arise to indicate that the common detox pathways need some help. Common symptoms include (but are not limited to):

- fatigue/muscle aches
- headaches
- bloating/abdominal pain
- constipation/diarrhea
- weight gain/difficulty losing weight
- acid reflux/heartburn/GERD
- mood swings/depression/anxiety
- brain fog/poor memory
- 10. PMS/decreased libido
- 11. sleep apnea/snoring
- 12. high cholesterol/high blood pressure
- 13. hypoglycemia
- 14. frequent colds/flu/sinus infections
- 15. excessive sweating/body odour

### What is a detox program?




