

Condo Development in Highland Creek

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Highland Creek is no ordinary neighbourhood. It unites traditional suburb with the relics of an older village-based community, all within the confines of the largest city in Canada. Among the many types of establishments we have in our space, one that doesn't come to mind is high-rise residences.

Altree Developments, an enterprise specializing in real estate

development, has purchased a parcel of land at the southwest corner of Military Trail and Old Kingston. The land is currently unused, save for a region occupied by an auto repair garage. The construction of twin mid-rise condominiums is being proposed, with 577 parking spaces across three levels of underground parking, and 620 residential units.

Within walking distance to the University of Toronto Scarborough, these units should have no trouble selling. However, questions are raised regarding the condos' impact upon traffic, the natural environ-

ment, the effect long-term on the valley below and neighbourhood ambience.

This particular development is the consolidation of neighbouring properties at 1625 Military Trail and 6000 Kingston Rd. The developers carried out predictions of how motor vehicle traffic levels would look in 2024 following construction of the buildings. They forecast a mild increase in traffic levels and interestingly, the intersection of Morrish and Old Kingston was not expected to be significantly impacted, even during peak hours.

The City of Toronto has previ-

ously published guidelines for development in Highland Creek. Among these, a major objective for the Village is the "consolidation of lands ... to facilitate more comprehensive developments on larger parcels." Along these lines, a set of urban design guidelines from the City recommends that developments in Highland Creek should range between 2-6 storeys in height. Altree has challenged this, submitting amendment proposals to the City on October 17, 2019 to allow for eight-storey twin mid-rises.



Highland Creek Library has been active for over 100 years now! The history of the branch started in 1890, when the Highland Creek Mechanics Institute was incorporated on January 28th. The Library opened in Elliot's Hall (Old Kingston Road near Military Trail), and in 1895, the Highland Creek Mechanics Institute became Highland Creek Public Library.

In 1930, Elliot's Hall was demolished and the library was relocated to a rent-free hall above a store (built 1861) at Old Kingston Road and Morrish Road. Gladys Cole became the librarian. In 1947, a government inspector ordered the library to be moved to more suitable premises, facing closure

Later, in 1964, it Scarborough. was relocated to a leased storefront at 277-279 Old Kingston Road, where it resided until a new building was built in 1994 at its current location, 3550 Ellesmere Rd.

Spread the Love at the Joy of Harvest

Selling jams, spices, sauces and chutneys for the past twenty years, Zonia and Calvin Slyfield have newly established a kitchen at 271 Old Kingston Rd. They have made their business known through various fairs and festivals, travelling as far as Belleville, Gravenhurst and Fort Erie to sell their products. Locally, you may have sighted Zonia at the Highland Creek Heritage Festival or the Autumn Festival in the Valley.

The idea behind the business first hatched at Zonia's former workplace, where she would bring her homemade jams to share with her co-workers. One of her co-workers suggested that she take them to market (literally), and so was born the Joy of Harvest. The business's first excursion was at the Markham Farmers' Market, where the three flavours on display were guava, orange marmalade and pineapple + ginger. As Calvin puts it "The important thing is knowing your market. You've got to know where to sell [your products]". Today, the business boasts as many as 20 varieties of flavours, many of which are imbued with a "tropical twist". Although the business operates by travelling to widespread community fairs, Zonia

has found herself a strong customer base. "They come back to bless their hearts," Zonia remarked. Indeed, partway during our chat, a harried mother dropped by to pick up mango jam for her young daughter, a picky eater who absolutely loves this particular jam. myself have tried their Naseberry and Guava jams and found them to be very sweet and wholesome. They have now topped Nutella as my go-to spread.

While the kitchen does not primarily serves as a store, if you're lucky enough to catch Zonia or Calvin in the kitchen, they would be happy to introduce you to their selection of homemade spreads and sauces.

The location of the development, in close proximity to the ravine, makes for a scenic view for its residents. However, shadows produced by the building risk harming the same vegetation and organisms that beautify and support this natural environment. Planning documents for the site state that a 10 metre buffer has been applied between the back of the property and the top of the bank. Although development is generally not permitted in such proximity to a natural heritage system, the application is put forth hinging on the understanding that natural heritage values will be recognized and adverse environmental impacts limited by the developers.

It is difficult to predict how this new infrastructure will affect the dynamic of Highland Creek. Small businesses in the area will likely benefit from a larger customer base. New links will be forged between residents of older and newer times. The Village however may also become a miniature college town, with rapid turnover of residents and insecure community cohesion.


















Just Like a Girl: Hooman and Pups Run

Community Updates from Councillor Jennifer McKelvie

It has been a busy few months at Toronto City Hall. Our office has been busy both advocating for our residents and attending community events, and we are grateful for all the feedback we've been receiving.

C40 Cities - The Future We Want

As a recovering Scientist, my happiest day as a politician was October 3rd when Toronto city council joined Paris, London, Los Angeles, Montreal, Vancouver and others in declaring a climate emergency. This advances our greenhouse gas reduction targets to net-zero by 2050. From October 9 to 12, I joined Mayor Tory and leaders from more than 90 cities at the C40 Cities Conference, where we discussed bold climate action. Representing more than 700 million citizens and one quarter of the global economy, mayors and municipal leaders of

C40 cities are committed to delivering on the most ambitious goals of the Paris Agreement at the local level. Fittingly the conference was called "The Future We Want" and the meeting was held in Copenhagen, a city with an ambitious goal of net zero by 2025 - and it looks like they are going to make it.

In Toronto, we've reduced our emissions by 44% over 1990 levels, ahead of our target

of 30% by 2020. This month, the City of Toronto under the leadership of Mayor John Tory, has launched the Green Will Initiative, a partnership between the City and major institutional and commercial landowners representing 300 million square feet of space to work together on reducing their carbon footprints. Ten partners have already signed on, including the City of Toronto, Toronto Community Housing, TDSB, TCSB, University Health Network, Ryerson University, University of Toronto, as well as three commercial owners Brookfield, Cadillac Fairview and Oxford. This is an important opportunity for the City's biggest landholders to show leadership and demonstrate what's possible to businesses and residents. I will continue to find ways to accelerate adoption of green technologies and accelerate our path to net zero.

Update on Transit in Toronto

As many of you know, the provincial government and the City have come to a tentative agreement on the future of transit investment. The province has committed to fully fund the 3-stop Scarborough subway and the Ontario Line; a 15 station, 15.5km rapid transit line for the downtown core. This commitment frees up funds for other transit projects and priorities. I believe that a portion of those freed-up funds should be spent building the Eglinton East LRT (EELRT).

I will be advocating relentlessly in the coming weeks and months to ensure that Scarborough gets momentum on building a comprehensive transit network that finally integrates us into the rest of the City. Your open and consistent support in getting Scarborough our fair share of transit funds, both vocal and written, would be warmly welcomed and greatly appreciated.





Health and Wellness Series by Dr. Karm Hans ND

Eczema is one of the most common skin conditions seen in clinical practice. One interesting point is that, in many cases, patients with eczema will also have symptoms of allergies or asthma, making this a condition that can affect many systems of the body. Overall, eczema is an autoimmune condition. Our body has a fantastic immune system; it is constantly looking for foreign agents (e.g. viruses and bacteria). Once it identifies a virus or bacteria, an immune reaction is initiated and this is associated with symptoms of feeling 'under the weather'. After a period of time the immune system does its job and things return to normal. With autoimmune conditions, the body has an overactive immune system. It starts to identify your body's own cells as being foreign. This triggers an immune reaction unnecessarily leading to symptoms such as eczema.

The exact cause of why autoimmune reactions happen is unknown, and as a result treatment can be difficult. The most common intervention for eczema is treatment with a steroid cream. This can be an extremely effective treatment as it basically tells the body's immune system to turn itself off. For short-term use steroid creams can be very helpful but over the long term patients find that creams can become ineffective. Also, there are many harmful side effects of long-term use of steroids. Studies have also shown a correlation between steroid cream use in an infant and the development of asthma later in life.

Naturopathic Medicine looks at the body as a whole. What this means is that the symptoms or concerns a patient comes in with are discussed in great detail, but then the rest of the body systems are also discussed (e.g. energy, stress, digestion, sleep, etc). This allows me to assess the most likely root cause of the symptoms for that particular patient. In my 11 years of practice I have found that there are a few typical root causes of eczema:

1. Food sensitivities - Sensitivities are different from allergies in the sense that the reaction to a food can happen immediately but it can also happen 3-5 days after you consume that food. This can make it very tricky to identify which foods you may have a sensitivity

2. Toxin overload - Our bodies are meant to be able to break down and eliminate any toxins we are exposed to in the air and in our food. Unfortunately, we are exposed to a lot of toxins and over time our body systems may become overwhelmed and not work as well as they should. It can be important to optimize our body's detoxification pathways.

3. Gut dysbiosis - We have good and bad bacteria inside and outside of our body. It is not about having one or the other; it is about having the correct balance between good and bad. There are many factors



to overgrow. This imbalance will have a negative effect on our immune system.

Stress - We all have stress in our lives. I find the biggest factors of why stress impacts our health is hugely connected to not having the tools to cope with the stress we have. Our mental/emotional health often gets forgotten. There is also still a stigma associated with dealing with our mental/emotional health. If we looked at going to a counsellor the same way we look at going for an annual physical, we would be far better at coping with stress.

Eczema is a symptom that can be treated through a natural approach. By investigating the root cause of the symptoms there is an opportunity for the body to truly heal. Treatment options include diet, botanicals, salves, supplements, etc. Every treatment is individualized to that can cause our good bacteria to be depleted and bad bacteria the patient and their symptoms. 

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



TDSB solves period poverty problem with free products

Proud to announce we at the Toronto District School **Board have voted to provide** free menstrual products to all students (free of cost to the Board).

'Period poverty' is the motivating factor behind the Toronto District School Board's new policy of providing free menstrual products to students in elementary and secondary schools. The initiative is in partnership with the charitable organization, Physical and Health Education Canada, which will be providing the products at no

charge to the TDSB.

Period poverty refers to barriers faced by menstruating girls and women who are unable to access or afford feminine hygiene products. The adoption of this policy sends the message to all students that TDSB trustees are unanimous in supporting the health and well-being of TDSB students.

Similar initiatives are also being explored at the provincial level, in hopes of getting all school boards in the province to adopt a similar policy. The issue of readily available menstrual products in schools should not only be viewed as an issue of economic access. Rather, it is also very much about helping remove the stigma surrounding periods.

The Toronto District School Board is currently working on the details of how to implement the initiative, but the plan is to provide the products this fall starting with students in Grades 7-12
